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## WE PRESENT...

Vapor Trails is not an ordinary yearbook, for it represents the combined efforts of the staffs of nine American high schools overseas. Scattered over three continents and in six countries, the students in these schools are nevertheless bound together by the common experience of going to school in a foreign land. The yearbook staff in each of the nine areas, which reach into Europe, Asia Minor and North Africa, emphasizes its own surroundings and background through its individual theme, pictures and art work in its own section.

We find many aspects of this life to be the same as pupils find them in the United States. The struggle with algebra, English and chemistry, the words Prom, basketball game, cheerleader and pep rally mean as much to us abroad as they do to those "back home".

There are differences, however, and one, of course, is our surroundings. Instead of an American background we have the sleepy English countryside, the green valleys of France and Germany, the burning deserts of Libya and Morocco, or the hills and mountains of Turkey.

We can explore palaces in England and castles in Germany and France; we can stand on the invasion grounds in North Africa or even where the Crusaders camped in Asia Minor long ago.

Life overseas has brought many changes to us, especially in our knowledge and in our understanding. Having ringside seats in watching political developments in the countries in which we are living, we can now better grasp the meaning of these nations' problems.

Attending concerts and parties, competing in sports events, working together in music programs, art exhibits and welfare projects with the young people of our host countries, we have learned new languages, new ways and new customs and have made lasting friendships. In our role as junior ambassadors we hope that we have left with our friends, the people who will guide the destiny of their country, an understanding and respect for us and our country.

So we present in pictures and words this record of our high school days - our 1958 Vapor Trails. May it serve as a treasure-chest of memories for each of us!


## TO THE USAFE HIGH SCHOOL SENIORS OF 1958

It is a real pleasure to extend to each of you congratulations for having successfully completed this important phase of your formal education.
