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## WE PRESENT...

We, the yearbook staffs of nine United States Air Force high schools overseas, present this, our third edition of VAPOR TRAILS. We have combined our efforts to form not only a yearbook and a treasury of memories but also, figuratively speaking, a guided tour through the six countries and three continents - Europe, Asia, and Africa - on which our schools are located. In each of the nine sections of our book we show our school days in the host country which many of us have known as home for three years or more. You, as you turn these pages, will see that no matter whether palm or plane trees, gilded domes or thatched cottages comprise a part of each school's background, the pupils of all nine are united by attending American schools outside their native land.

Our pictures, stories, and art work of classroom scenes and school events emphasize the similarity of our lives with those of our counterparts in the United States. We study English, French, algebra, and chemistry; we learn world geography, history, and American government; we try-out for plays, teams, and cheerleading; we join clubs, sing in choruses, help with carnivals, laugh with the freshmen during initiation week, and dance at parties and the junior-senior proms; and we wait breathlessly for class rings, yearbooks, and graduation day. These and many other activities we share with high school pupils from Maine to California.

Similar as our school life is to that in the United States, however, our living in a foreign country holds added interests. Our outlook broadens and
our understanding of other peoples increases through our knowledge of their histories, languages, customs, and laws. Geography means more when the English Channel, the Seine, the Rhine, and the Mediterranean are no longer just names on a map. History becomes a colorful pageant when we explore the Tower of London, an ancient Roman Camp in Germany, a crusaders castle in Turkey, the gardens of Versailles, or the ruins of a once lovely, ancient city in Libya or Morocco. As we become better acquainted overseas, we can help strengthen the bonds of friendship and peace among freedom loving peoples, now while as junior ambassadors we live among our new friends, and in later years when we assume adult responsibilities in the United States.

Skimming through these pages of Vapor Trails in days to come will bring to mind recollections of school days, classroom scenes, and friends overseas. We shall recall the pleasure of making a mercury barometer in the science laboratory, the thrill of cheering for the team, and the excitement of planning a school dance. We shall also remember eating hot, buttered scones beside an English fire, buying trinkets in exotic Eastern bazaars with the sun blazing down upon us, mailing souvenir cards to ourselves and our friends from the tiny post office at the top of the Eiffel Tower, trekking through the Black Forest in Lederbosen, or watching the great black camels swaying along dusty desert roads. Crowded with many memories, our 1959 Vapor Trails is a book to be cherished - always.


## MEMBERS OF THE GRADUATING CLASS:

I congratulate you upon completion of your high school studies at United States Air Forces in Europe schools. Prior to the summer of 1942, the Bushy Park Air Force Base area was the Royal Deer Park of the Hampton Court Palace. At this time, the Eighth Air Force, a unit of the Army Air Forces, set up its Headquarters in what is now referred to as "A" Block. By August, the Eighth Air Force Service Command, a sub-unit of the Eighth Air Force, was installed in the newly completed "B" Block, which is now the High School building. "C" and "D" Blocks, present day Elementary School and dormitory areas, were finished one year later.

In January, 1944, General Dwight D. Eisenhower was designated Supreme Commander of the Allied Expeditionary Forces, and established his Headquarters at Bushy Park. This organization, known as SHAEF, occupied "C" and "D" Blocks, and certain outlying buildings, some of which have now disappeared. The Eighth Air Force organizations previously mentioned were redesignated as Headquarters United States Strategic Air Force in Europe, and Headquarters of the Air Service Command, respectively. Shortly after D-Day, in June 1944, all these Headquarters moved to France.

Bushy took on the aspect of a miniature Grand Central Station. Among the group of VIPs were such famous people as Churchill, George VI, Field Marshal Lord Montgomery, General Spaatz, General Patton, Lord Tedder, General De Gaulle, and many others.
