We watched 60 Min II last night about classmates.com. Yes, I am the Hal Dayhuff who went to Bushy Park Central High to school. Dad was the US Army representative at the Imperial Defense College at Grosvenor Square. We lived in the village of Shepperton, Middlesex on the Thames River and I rode the train every day to school. I would leave the kerosene can at the station in the morning and pick it up to bring home and fill the Aladdin burners in the afternoon.

Stood out in the rain to watch the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth II at Hyde Park Corner. Skipped school to see it, Dad said is was ok since I would probably not see one in my lifetime again. Sifted soft coal to keep the house half way warm. Could run up the long escalators of the Underground in a flash.

We returned to the US in 1954 and Dad was assigned to the Pentagon. We lived in Arlington Va. I graduated from Washington Lee HS 1955 and then from the Virginia Military Institute in 1959 and went into the Army.

Took a English History Class at VMI and never cracked a book. I had seen and been to all that was discussed. It was great. It was still fresh in my mind and I could add the rest of the story to it all. You know first hand is better than someone else dividing it up.

This is the article, written by Charles Hal Dayhuff, III,(55) that I found on the Internet, that led me to locate him.

On December 30, 1952, my mother, father, sister and I climbed the gangplank of the largest ship I had ever seen as a 14 year old. We were going to Southampton on the SS United States. My father, a Colonel in the United States Army was being assigned to the Imperial Defense College of the British Armed Forces in London, England for a year. We were one of the first military families to sail on the ship. In order to get to England in the 50's you went by ship. We were initially going on the USS Hubbard, but it was decommissioned and the next day they said we would have to go to New York and would be on the SS United States. Needless to say we were all excited.

It was in the dead of winter, and we were going to spend New Year's in the middle of the Atlantic on a record setting race. It was something else. Yes, 47 years ago today (this letter was written in 1999) we landed in Southampton, England, having set the record for crossing the Atlantic in the dead of winter. During the voyage we were constantly told of the ship's speed and the location in the Ocean. The New Year's party was really great.

From this first there was another in the summer of 1953, when I stood out on the street of Hyde Park to see the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth II. Again, a chance of a lifetime.

Then when we returned to the United States in the fall of 1953 we sailed on the sister ship of the SS United States, the SS America.

I have an article that I cut out of the Atlanta Journal-Constitution on December 27, 1997, telling of the plight of the ship. I have fond memories of the Great Ship, and hope it could he preserved as a museum.

In the same NATO Housing area, we had French, Dutch, Belgium, Italy, and some other countries military personnel living there. No British because, there were senior NCOs living in the area and the British would not let their officers live in the same place as the NCOs. Now that I think about it, the quarters were 3 story Garden Type apartments, with officers and NCOs intermingled all together. We had 5 or 6 buildings with at least 20 to 25 apartments in each building. My father's assignment was with NATO, not with any U.S. Military Unit. That's the reason for all the different countries military personnel being there. The U.S. Personnel came from all the branches of the U.S. Military, Army, Air Force, Navy, and so forth.

I lived in the dorm and was one of those that didn't get to go home, except for Christmas, Easter, and the summer. My father was stationed in Norway at the time. The next year, my Sophomore, all of us kids from Norway were sent to Gen. H.H. Arnold High in

Wiesbaden. Dorm time again. After my Sophomore year, my father was transferred back to the land of the Big PX, at Fort Monmouth, NJ, where I was able to go to go to the same school for 2 years in a row. Radical, at the time, for me. I graduated in 62 from a civilian High School in Red Bank, NJ.
