

Coralie "Coco" Guertin (55) Lajoie 1937 – February 4, 2018

WORCESTER, MA - Raymond W. and Coralie A. Lajoie, together for 63 years, died this past week a day apart. Coco passed away on Sunday, February 4, 2018, and Ray passed away on Monday, February 5, 2018.

Ray and Coco were married 60 years. Ray was part of the golf staff at Worcester Country Club for 47 years retiring as head professional in 1996. Coco worked with him in the pro shop for the 27 years that Ray was head pro. Together, they organized the annual Lori Lajoie Charity Golf Tournament, named after their daughter, which has raised more than \$6 million for the Seven Hills Foundation which provides services to individuals with disabilities and significant life challenges.

Ray was born in Worcester in 1934, son of Wilfred and Eva (Aucoin) Lajoie. He attended Commerce High School in Worcester and began his golf career in 1946 caddying at Worcester Country Club. Ray then began working in the pro shop for John Bernardi. He later served as caddie master and assistant professional before being named head professional in 1971. He held memberships in the PGA, and the American Contract Bridge League where Ray was a Club Master Player. He travelled to many Ryder Cups and, along with Coco, started the PGA Member Hospitality Service Tent at the 1999 Ryder Cup in Brookline, MA. It has been carried on to every Ryder Cup since. Ray and Coco have met and serviced US Presidents, celebrities, and numerous golfing legends including Byron Nelson.

Ray was honored many times during his life for his contributions to the game of golf, the NEPGA, and the PGA. The New England Professional Golfers Association named Ray Golf Professional of the Year in 1988 and inducted him into its Hall of Fame in 2006. In 2015, he was the first New England professional to receive the Deacon Palmer Award, an award received by golfing legend Arnold Palmer prior to his death. Upon Ray's retirement, he was named an honorary life member of Worcester Country Club. He was a superb golf business mentor; seventeen of Ray's assistant professionals went on to become head golf professionals at courses spanning the USA. Ray was a well-known expert in golf club repair... golf icons Jack Nicklaus and Lee Trevino personally sought out Ray for club repair.

Coco was born in Leominster in 1937, daughter of Henry and Rita (Gagné) Guertin. Her family followed her father around the world during his military service. She attended grammar school in Japan, and schools in Tombstone, AZ and Grass Valley, CA before completing her education at

the American School in London. She was a voracious reader, loved to travel, and made many trips to Aruba- a paradise she loved dearly- with family members.

Ray and Coco lived in West Boylston for 25 years where they raised their 4 children before moving to Northbridge in 1999. After Ray's retirement at Worcester Country Club, he became the head pro at Leicester Golf Club where he and Coco ran all aspects of golf operations for three years. Coco also worked as a host at the Valley Café in Whitinsville in her retirement years.

The lives of Ray and Coco were highlighted by a strong sense of family, charity, philanthropy and generosity. They lived each day serving the needs of others above self. During their 63 years together, they were never apart for more than a week. Their love for each other was a shining example for all to emulate. And perhaps most important, Ray and Coco were excellent, loving parents.

Ray and Coco leave a son, John M. Lajoie and his wife Susan of Sterling; a daughter, Lynn M. Ellsworth of North Oxford; seven grandchildren: Chester B. Marek III and his wife Laura of Worcester, Angela Marek of Worcester, Dr. Jason M. Lajoie and his wife Anna Margolin of Brighton, Jessica L. Genna and her husband Anthony of Mendon, Jacqueline R. Lajoie of Sterling, Chelsea M. Ellsworth of Brighton, and Elizabeth L. Ellsworth of Holiday, FL; four great-grandchildren; and many nieces and nephews. They were predeceased by 2 daughters, Lori A. Lajoie who died in 2001, and Lisa M. Marek who died in 2008.

Coco also leaves five siblings, Cindy Porter and her husband Tom of LA, Ann Mitchell and her husband Carrie of TX, Susan Dagg and her husband Robert of FL, Sherry Guertin of TX, and Michelle Roy of Millbury. She was predeceased by a brother, Henry Guertin, Jr. Ray also leaves a sister, Helene Toursie and her husband Paul, of Merrimack, NH. He was predeceased by his sister Helen Pfeffer, and his brother John H. Lajoie who died in the Korean War.

Ray and Coco will be waked and honored together. The funeral Mass was held February 17, 2018, at Immaculate Conception Church, 353 Grove St., Worcester, MA. Burial was private.

ALMYRA, PA - Cynthia B. (Guertin) Porter, 80, died of natural causes July 23, 2020, in Palmyra, Pa. Cynthia was born in Leominster, Mass., Sept. 4, 1939. She was the second of seven children born to Henry Guertin Sr. and Rita G. (Gagne) Guertin. Cindy, as she was known to her friends, lived a full and active life. She

lived in Japan, England, and many places across the country as her family relocated to her father's various assignments in the United States Army. She relished her father's service to the nation and regarded her childhood in a military family as a wonderful educational experience.

Cindy graduated from Mineral Wells High School in Mineral Wells, TX, in 1957 and was the first in her family to attend college. She began her college days at Mississippi State College for Women in Columbus, Miss., majoring in English. While in school she met and married Thomas (Tom) E.

She spent many years teaching English. After receiving her master's degree in Education from Memphis State University she worked as a guidance counselor both at Caruthersville Junior and Senior High Schools. She spent the last few years of her career as the high school principal. Cindy was active in the Sacred Heart Catholic Church as a Lecture. She loved to read and do cross word puzzles.

After retiring she and Tom travelled to Europe, Russia, and Egypt. They moved to Louisiana in 1995 to be closer to their children. Cindy continued working in education at St. Mary's Catholic School as a teacher and temporary principal.

She is survived by her two sons, Lt. Col. Thomas G. Porter, Alexandria, Va., and the Rev. Christopher G. Porter, Jonestown, Pa., and their spouses, Stacey and Nannette; five grandchildren; 10 great-grandchildren; four siblings, Ann Mitchell of Bedford, Texas, Susan Dagg of Silver Springs, Fla., Sherri Guertin of Georgetown, TX, and Michelle Roy of Milbury, MA.

She is preceded in death by her parents, husband, and two siblings, Henry Guertin and Coralie Lajoie.
