Once upon a time, on July 27, 2021, I received a letter from Pat Owen asking if I had attended Central High School, Bushy Park, London. What a delightful surprise! I had not been in touch with anyone for all those years. I had no idea that reunions had taken place. What fun. I keep meaning to write something for the Bushy Tales but have few recollections from those days. So here is a brief recap and a recent magazine article I thought I would share.

My father, MSgt. Darrell A. Gates, was stationed at Weathersfield A.F.B. for three years, 1955-1958. My two younger sisters and I went to school on base. We lived off base in a two story house in a village called Rayne near Braintree, Essex County. We rode double decker buses everywhere we went. It was safe in those days. For my sophomore year I attended Bushy Park and boarded in the dorm. A few of us were transported on a military bus every Sunday afternoon for a three-hour ride to Bushy Park. I played cards, mostly Hearts, with some of the guys enroute. Then on Friday afternoons it was back to Weathersfield and weekend with my family and local friends. I enjoyed my classes and my dorm roommates and was very happy with the whole experience. We left England in 1958 and were stationed at Castle AFB in California. That was the end of my travel as a military dependent. My military experiences helped me in my career with NASA during the Apollo program as I had a good ear for dialects and acceptance of people from around the globe.

Recently a local magazine did a little feature story about me which I thought I would share as it gives a little recap of where I have been for the past 50 years. And, since I was on the cover, I can show you that at age 80 one can still be a cover girl. O.

GET TO KNOW YOUR NEIGHBOR

Longtime Islander Continues to Serve the Community BY STEPHANIE LODER

 ${f T}$ alk to Darleen Hunt about her life on Merritt Island, and she'll give you colorful details.

Raised in an Air Force family, she moved every three years to a different place (Mississippi, Japan, New Jersey, England) ending up in California where she met her husband, Jerry. In 1967, they moved to Brevard County.

"When we built our home in a 5-acre orange grove in 1977, Merritt Island became the hometown I never had. All three of our wonderful children Darrell Hunt, Jerrine Mullon, and Shannah Trout married and raised their families on North Merritt Island."

She joined the NASA Public Affairs Office at Kennedy Space Center (KSC), in the Public Information Branch. Hunt began as a secretary then became a public information officer and editor of the bi-weekly newspaper *Spaceport News*.

"Thousands of news media from around the world covered the manned space program," she recalled. During the Apollo era, Walter Cronkite with CBS News would say "Hi Darleen" as he came into the office to cover a launch.

Later, Hunt moved to the Protocol and Special Events Branch. Her office was responsible for Space Shuttle launch guests, distributing thousands of auto passes for public viewing on KSC, and arranging for VIP guest viewing. This included coordinating with KSC employees to serve as escorts for special guests and groups and occasionally serving as a host herself.

In this role, Hunt met celebrities such as singer John Denver, author James Mitchner, and movie star Robert Redford. Special events would include astronaut-return ceremonies and open houses where thousands of employees could bring family and friends into their work areas.

After 32 years with NASA, Hunt retired and became more involved in the community she loved. "I helped form the North Merritt Island Homeowners Association in 1986 and have been an active part ever since," she said.

She wrote a monthly newsletter, *Courtenay Notes*, and followed local activities, including the purchase of the Environmentally Endangered Lands (EEL) Pine Island Conservation Area, the widening of North Courtenay Parkway to a four-lane road, zoning changes and environmental issues such as stormwater flooding.

When the Sams House Nature Center was created, Hunt saw the need for a friends' group and helped establish the Pine Island Preservation Society, which meets monthly and sponsors education events like Pioneer Day.

"We will have about 1,500 visitors who enjoy pioneer-related exhibits, vendors, music, and lots of children's activities." she said. This year's Pioneer Day is set for Saturday, February 11. A devoted Catholic, Hunt attends Divine Mercy on Merritt Is-





land where she is involved in activities such as the Art and Environment Ministry and serves as a Eucharistic minister.

"As for art, that's a biggie," said Hunt who has spent her life drawing, painting, weaving, sewing, silk painting and making stained glass.

Her primary media is watercolor, and her work has been exhibited at festivals locally and throughout Florida, including Disney's Festival of the Masters. She is an active member of the Brevard Watercolor Society.

For 20 years, Hunt served on the Merritt Island Wildlife Association Board, which works to enhance the experience of the thousands who visit the Wildlife Refuge at KSC.

Her husband has a passion for planting trees and has dozens of exotics, such as sapodilla, canistel and wax jambu, plus others like citrus, coconut, avocado and star fruit. Hunt and Jerry often tour visitors to show what can be grown on tropical North Merritt Island.

"We like to live off the land. Our yard is like a botanical garden. My husband tells everyone we live in paradise. I agree," she said.
