The weekends we didn't "stay over," I would take the train to London on Sunday noon to go to the Embassy for the American Teenage Club meetings/get together.

The house we rented in Penn was one of the homes of Sir Charles Colston - the Director of Hoover

Vacuum. We had tennis court, pool, 73 acres where bullocks grazed. All for \$600.00 a month. We even had a live-in maid and her husband the gardener. My dad was a civilian architect for the US military. He lived in England from '53-'56. He had lived in Japan '51-'53.

When I came back to the states, my parents put me in a girls' school because most of my friends were pretty wild, most of girls already had babies. I had to repeat my Junior year and went there for my Senior year.

Harold and I were both in Calif. and he started at West Point when I was a senior. We got pinned and were pinned for a year. Then with me going off to college, I didn't want to be pinned... Bad choice. Harold was wonderful and probably would have saved me a divorce... Oh Well!!!


## **Letters to the Editor**

1955

You're in the Army now





Once in Sedalia we rented a house and Dad bought me a '52 Pontiac. I barely passed the driver's exam.

Two months to go before my eighteenth birthday.

This was all well and good, but I wanted to join the Army to better my chances of making my way to England and marrying Sandra Simpson. So, in early November 1958 I went to the Recruiting Office, took a test and the Sergeant said here is a train and meal ticket. Be on the 10 o'clock to

Kansas City tomorrow and check in to the Military Enlistment Center. If you can pass the medical, you will be inducted. I passed. Next the staff prepared a hometown news release, put me in a partial uniform, took a photo, made an ID card and put me on a Greyhound bus bound for Fort Leonard Wood. Once there, fun and games were over.

The first stop was for a haircut. Yes, what you have heard is true. Next a general briefing and fifteen minutes to memorize our service number. RA17534686 sir! Of course, everything we did and everywhere we went was at a run. So, we ran over to clothing issue. In late 1958 the Army was still issuing brown boots and a bottle of black dye. Naturally this has to be accomplished by the next morning formation. None of all this is news to vets. Men were selected for KP, guard duty and fire guard. I was the latter.

Three days later we were transported to our training company C-3-2. All of the things you've heard about basic training are for the most part true. If you ever enlist in the military, early November is good because you'll get two weeks paid Christmas leave. My uncle picked me up and drove me to Sedalia. Good to be home but not any closer to the wedding chapel. So, in early January it was back to training.

Believe it or not the instructors expected us to bivouac six nights in the freezing cold. As luck would have it, cold it was.

Our training company made the five-mile march to the bivouac area only to be greeted by the safety officer who said no, no, it's too cold for training. He was right, January ended up being the coldest on Missouri record.

The final days of basic centered around marching skills and listening to motivational speakers in the Post Theater. As a bonus if you passed a vigorous personnel and barracks inspection you could apply for a three-day pass. My buddies and I made it, and we headed by car to Kansas City. It was a welcome relief.

A few days before graduation we received our orders. I was being sent to somewhere in Texas to Nike missile school. Well, I too had a friend in personnel, and he said he would notify my unit and that I would be a hold-over for not more than two weeks. I asked my Sergeant what should I do

until new orders came in? Oh, just help the newbies with their displays or making their bunks. Just make yourself useful. You can bunk in one of the cadre rooms. In 1958 there were US and RA enlisted men. Even though I was an E2, I had no visible rank. Still, I noticed the newbies were careful around me. Ten days later my orders arrived. I was going one mile away to Unit Supply school, MOS 768.10 for eight weeks.

It was such a relief, no KP, Guard or Fire Guard duty. Just school Monday thru Friday and we could leave the post on the weekends. Remember Waynesville? I was amazed how much goes on in a unit supply (MOS 76000) much less that it took eight weeks to learn it.

Graduation day soon arrived and with duffle bag, meal and train tickets I was taken to the Waynesville train station headed for my new assignment. I had exactly one dime in my pocket. NEW ASSIGNMENT HINT: Fort Belvoir, Virginia

[Note from Editor: Murray, an excellent question. I have not specifically addressed this point during my time as editor. Perhaps Gary Schroeder did at some point. I know when I was there in London from May 1954 to November 1955, I was struck by the fact that it had been just 9 years since the end of WWII. Great Britain was hit very hard during the war, as evident by the many destroyed buildings and sites throughout London and many other areas in Britain. Britain was hit very hard financially and struggling to rebuild. Property owners were limited to rebuilding on the original building foundation to limit costs. Life throughout Britain was still very much like it was before WWII. Virtually all cars in use were pre-WWII vintage, in many cases by a lot. I remember seeing workers in London in a ditch in a city street. They were wearing a suit with a vest and a dress shirt and tie!
