

“Purton is a large village and civil parish in north Wiltshire, England, about 4 miles (6 km) northwest of the centre of Swindon. The parish includes the village of Purton Stoke and the hamlets of Bentham, Hayes Knoll, Purton Common, Restrop, The Fox and Widham.”

From me:

In 1954 dad was assigned to Fairford AFB, UK. We rented a house named Packhorse Corners, near Swindon. The property was at one time a Way Station with a hotel as the main structure, along with several attached cabins. The locals were not sure what to make of my sister and me, what with our shiny bicycles and California-style clothes.

We were transported daily to a DOD school, which was a two-story manor house with about 35 students.

In 1955, in order for me to attend Bushy, my dad was transferred to West Dayton. We rented a house near Staines/Laleham overlooking the Thames River.

Contract school buses (#102) provided transport to and from Bushy Park near Kingston.

There, you can click on a class you want to explore. You will then see a list of all the people who were part of that graduating class (any time during their stay at Bushy Park). If you find a name that you want to look at further, click on the name for the yearbook year you want to view. Not everyone who attended Bushy Park made it into the yearbook. It depended on when they were there. Because the yearbooks were published in the USA, the lead time was huge.

You can, for any class, scroll to the very bottom of the list of names. There you will see an image of the cover of that class's yearbook. Click on it, and you can scroll through the yearbook page by page, looking for whomever you are seeking by name or image.
